

2. Choose a city you know well, perhaps in the country you come from, and **make a list** of all the famous landmarks in that city.
3. In the story the animals had lots of fun. They swung on the swings, ate ice cream and tried on fancy hats and shoes.

What sort of mischief do you think other wild animals around the world might have got up to in the cities when there was no one around to stop them?

Perhaps they went to an adventure park or took the elevator up the Statue of Liberty in New York!

4. What did the animals in the story notice about the sky and the air when they came to the city?

Sometimes a “haze” hangs over the city, why do you think that is?

What else looked unusually clean?

5. **Make a list** of all the things which you think might cause:

a) **pollution in the air**

b) **pollution in the sea**

6. How does it affect us, and what can we do to help lessen pollution?

7. *“Everyone loves the beach!”* one of the camels said, *“They take their clothes off and lie in the sun.”* The other animals thought this a very strange thing to do.

What other human behaviour do you think surprises animals?

8. The horses said that animals don't need people.

Do you think this is true?

9. A lot of people depend on animals to help them. Camels and donkeys have worked for humans for hundreds of years. We call them domesticated animals. But once upon a time they were wild as well.

Perhaps you can **find out** where camels were originally domesticated.

The answer may surprise you!

12. What sort of relationship do you think Ali had with the littlest camel?




Do you have that kind of special relationship with an animal, a dog perhaps?

DRAMA IDEAS

- In pairs, A is a domesticated animal and B is a wild one.

Ask each other questions to find out about each other's lives.

- The teacher can call out different times of the day and the children in role as different animals create a still image of what they are doing at that particular time e.g. early morning: wild animals might be hunting/going to the water hole to drink whilst domesticated animals are eating/drinking from a trough.

When the teacher claps their hands the "animals" come to life.

- Hot-seat animals and birds you met in the story, including:
 - ❖ A camel - to find out about his life in the desert
 - ❖ A lion - to find out about his life in the African savannah
 - ❖ The littlest camel - to find out about Ali and her relationship with him
 - ❖ Ali - to find out about his dream at the end of the story

- Make paper plate masks of the animals and re-enact the story.
